



Mokelumne Trail Bike and Pedestrian Overcrossing

Connecting communities to active transportation, transit, and recreation

OVERVIEW

The Mokelumne Bicycle and Pedestrian Overcrossing Project constructed an 850-foot-long bridge spanning Highway 4 in Brentwood that now provides safe access to cyclists and pedestrians for commuting and recreational travel.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Prior to the 1870's, this region was occupied by the Miwok and Yokut Indian tribes. Known for growing an array of fresh fruit and vegetables, the City of Brentwood is now home to more than 68,000 people.
- The name "Mokelumne" comes from the Miwok tribe and means "people of the fishing nets," referring to the dip netting of Salmon by the indigenous people who inhabited our California coastline.

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DESIGN HIGHLIGHTS

- Multi-span bridge with a column in the Highway 4 median
- Bridge approaches constructed on earthen embankments
- Provides access and connection to the future Brentwood Transit Center
- 16-foot wide path for cyclists and pedestrians to safely cross Highway 4
- Width will accommodate future autonomous shuttle travel

COSTS & FUNDING

The cost to design and build the bridge was approximately \$13 million, with funding provided through Measure J taxpayer dollars, the State Route 4 Bypass Authority, and Bay Area Toll Authority (BATA) bridge toll funds.

SCHEDULE

Construction on this project began in March 2022 and was completed in March 2024.
